An insight into the tenderness that Catherine McAuley demonstrated to those who were sick is the chapter she wrote, in the Original Rule, on the Visitation of the sick. A new programme at Mercy International Centre will explore the underlying values that motivated Catherine McAuley and the early Mercy communities to provide comfort to the sick and dying.

- How did Catherine's connections to the medical profession through her family, the Callaghans and the Armstrongs influence her actions?
- What role did complementary medicines have in the practices of the early Sisters, particularly in response to cholera epidemics?
- How did the Sisters respond to the call of the injured in the Crimean War?
- What were the groundbreaking practices that Catherine introduced into hospitals?
 - Dialogue together how mercy continues to contribute to the comfort of the sick and dying in the light of ethical dilemmas facing Mercy healthcare today.
